A short lesson:

What does fair housing mean?

Fair housing means your family is free to choose where you live!

Fair housing laws make it against the law for anyone to discriminate against your family in selling you a house or renting you an apartment on the basis of your race, color, religion, gender, disability, family status (families with children), or national origin.



What is Housing Discrimination?

DISCRIMINATION IN HOUSING is when someone tells your family they can't rent the apartment or buy the house because they have children.

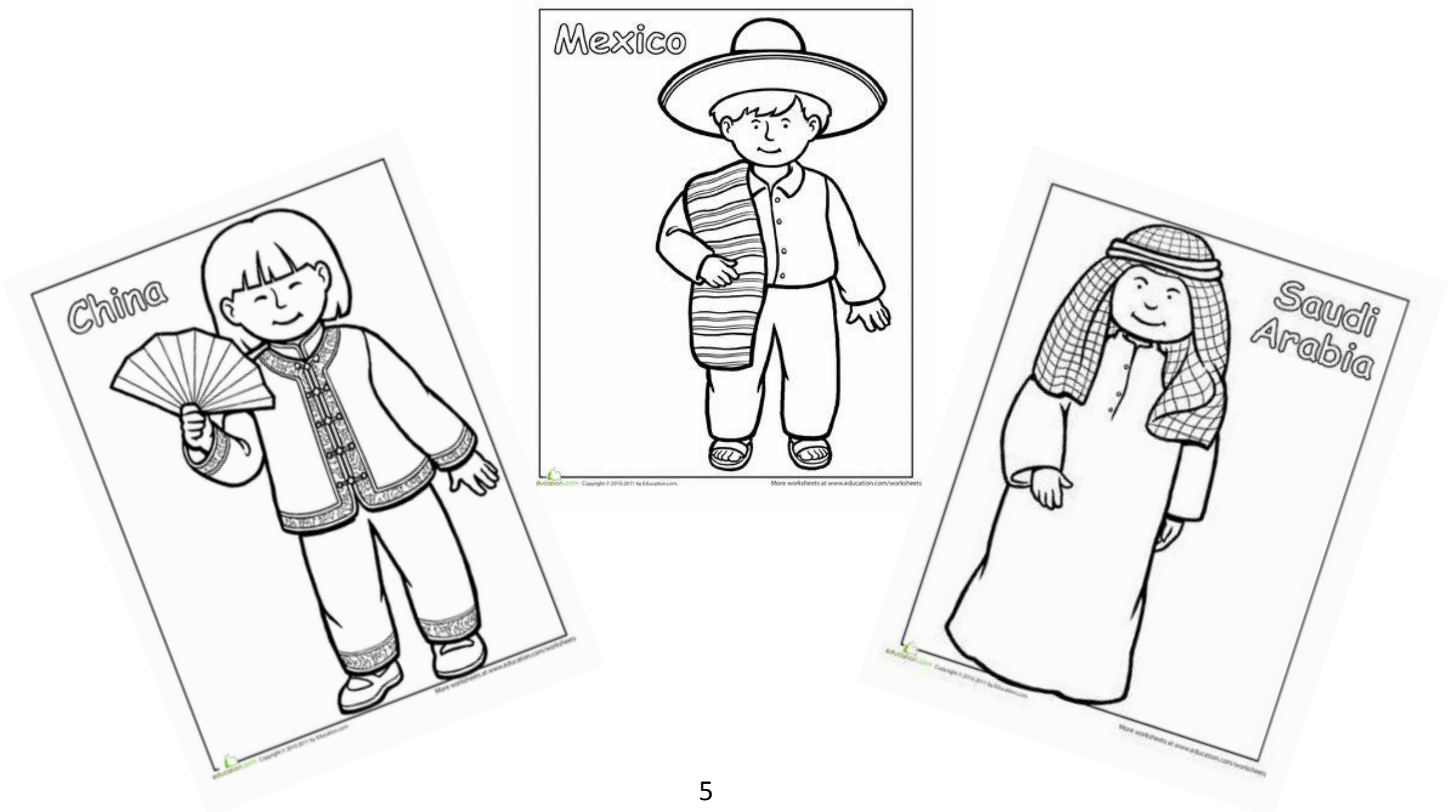


What is Housing Discrimination?

DISCRIMINATION IN HOUSING is when people are treated differently because of something they can't change. One example of something you can't change is the color of your skin.



Another example of something you can't change is your national origin, which means the country you were born in.



What is Housing Discrimination?

DISCRIMINATION IN HOUSING is when a person with a disability can't get into an apartment or enjoy its full use because of things like steps or steep slopes.



The Federal Fair Housing Act

The Federal Fair Housing Act was adopted by congress, on April 11, 1963, just 7 days after the death of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Congress passed the Fair Housing Act, saying that discrimination in housing is against the law. President Lyndon Johnson signed the bill into law on April 11, 1968.

This year marks the 50th anniversary of the passage of the Federal Fair Housing Act!



Here are some things you can do to help promote fair housing:

- Set a good example by treating all people alike.
- Be a good neighbor! Volunteer in your community.
- Make a friend in school who might be a little different from you.
- Learn about the people who live in your neighborhood and about where you and others are from.
- Start or join a stop-bullying campaign at your school.
- At lunch, sit with someone you have not sat with before.

April marks 50 years of the federal Fair Housing Act. The Fair Housing Act is one of the most important laws in America because where you live impacts all areas of your life including:

- Access to living wage jobs
- Access to quality food and healthcare
- Access to high performing schools
- Access to safe lenders

When you are denied an integrated community your life can be impacted in many ways including:

- Raising your chances of becoming incarcerated
- Decreasing your income
- Decreasing the chances your child will attend college.

Fair housing benefits everyone! Fair housing:

- Strengthens communities
- Strengthens business and the economy
- Strengthens families.

The Fair Housing Act is a powerful tool for expanding housing and housing opportunity. Prairie State Legal Service, HomeStart and the City of Freeport are dedicated in assisting the community and its residents with enforcing the Federal Fair Housing Act and making an inclusive community.
